#### Crows Nest / Nikki Mottram F 2023

Dana soon learns that in the country, city rules do not apply. When Sandra and her best friend are found shot dead, Dana is drawn into an investigation that will force her to strip away the friendly veneer of smalltown life, while grappling with ghosts of her own.

## The Bookbinder of Jericho / Pip Williams F 2023

It is 1914, and as the war draws the young men of Britain away to fight, women must keep the nation running. Two of those women are Peggy and Maude, twin sisters who live on a narrowboat in Oxford and work in the bindery at the university press.

## The Outback Court Reporter / Jamelle Wells NF 2024

Jamelle Wells takes you into our country courtrooms, from the grand sandstone edifices of Cobar and Grafton to the repurposed community halls and police stations in outback Queensland the Northern Territory - introducing you to the court staff - the solicitors, prosecutors, magistrates, witnesses and the accused, in cases that shock, captivate and divide communities.

#### The Exchange / John Grisham F 2023

With the only world she knew crumbling around her, Dassi found the strength to fight, leading a brave fifteen-year campaign to bring (her abuser) back to face Australian courts.

# Ion Idriess : the last interview / Tim Bowden NF 2024

Ion is recognised as one of Australia's great storytellers, having published over 50 books. This book is his last interview in 1975, prompted by the then-young Tim Bowden, for a possible ABC Radio program that did not eventuate due to Idriess's fading voice.

# Dirt and dust: a teenage perspective on life after the suicide of a parent / Amelia Olsen with Riley Olsen NF 2021

The tumultuous story of circumstances surrounding the death of a family member, told by eighteen-year-old Riley and his mum, Amelia, who rode 1400-kilometres on dirt bikes to the tip of Cape York, Queensland - the most northern point of Australia. With a combination of Amelia's hilarious, yet heartwarming struggle to complete the physical challenges of the ride, along with Riley's attempt to comprehend the loss of his father, this account of their epic journey makes a tough topic an easy read.

#### Misselthwaite / Susan Moody F 2023

In her sequel to Frances Hodgson Burnett's "The Secret Garden", Susan Moody takes Mary, Colin and Dick on into adult life, and a world that encompasses the battlefields of France, the bright lights of London in the twenties and India under the Raj, but always returning to the Yorkshire moors.

#### Thursday's Child / Nicci French F 2016

When psychotherapist Frieda Klein left the sleepy Suffolk coastal town in which she grew up, she never intended to return. Left behind were friends, family, lives and loves but alongside them, painful memories; a past she wouldn't allow to destroy her. Then, years later, an old classmate appears in London asking Frieda to help her teenage daughter and long buried memories resurface. Death soon follows, leaving Frieda no choice but to return home to confront her past.

# The Thursday Murder Club Series / Richard Osman F 2020-2023

In a peaceful retirement village, four unlikely friends meet up once a week to investigate unsolved killings. But when a local property developer shows up dead, "The Thursday Murder Club" find themselves in the middle of their first live case. The four friends, Elizabeth, Joyce, Ibrahim and Ron, might be octogenarians, but they still have a few tricks up their sleeves. Can our unorthodox but brilliant gang catch the killer before it's too late?

### Sensible Shoes: A Story about the Spiritual Journey / Sharon Garlough Brown F 2013-2018

Sharon Garlough Brown tells the moving story of four strangers as they reluctantly arrive at a retreat centre and find themselves drawn out of their separate stories of isolation and struggle and into a collective journey of spiritual practice, mutual support and personal revelation.

### The Hidden Life of Trees: what they feel, how they communicate: discoveries from a secret world / Peter Wohlleben NF 2016

A forester's fascinating stories, supported by the latest scientific research, reveal the extraordinary world of forests and illustrate how trees communicate and care for each other.

### Water at the Roots: Poems and Insights of a Visionary Farmer / Philip Britts NF 2018

His story is no romantic agrarian elegy, but a life lived in the thick of history. As his country plunged headlong into World War II, he joined an international pacifist community, the Bruderhof, and was soon forced to leave Europe for South America.

Amidst these great upheavals, his response – to root himself in faith, to dedicate himself to building community, to restore the land he farmed, and to use his gift with words to turn people from their madness – speaks forcefully into our time. In an age still wracked by racism, nationalism, materialism, and ecological devastation, the life he chose and the poetry he composed remain a prophetic challenge.

### Call of the Reed Warbler: a new agriculture: a new earth / Charles Massy NF 2017

In this groundbreaking book Charles Massy explores regenerative agriculture and the vital connection between our soil and our health. Using his personal farming experience as a touchstone, he tells the real story behind industrial agriculture and the global profitobsessed corporations driving it. He shows how innovative farmers are finding a new way, regenerating their land and witnessing astounding transformations.

### Walking Among the Stars: an epic tale of the **Australian Outback / Michael Chambers** F 2020

While jackaroo Tom Duncan is courting Bonnie Reid from Moomley Downs in the 1970's outback, he discovers hidden clues from the past; of the aboriginal Ngiyampaa people and their heritage of stories from ancient times. So what happened, when the early settlers, enticed by dreams of vast grazing lands, left the security of the great rivers, and finally approached the real arid outback? How were they greeted by the occupants? In a celebration of the Australian Outback, Michael Chambers draws on his own experiences, and a hundred and fifty years of his wife's family as graziers. He weaves the stories of the Ngiyampaa people, as recounted by his friend and their Elder, Roy Kennedy, into one epic tale, brimming with the sheer vastness and rugged beauty of the Outback.

#### The Redhead of Auschwitz: a true story / Nechama Birnbaum NF 2021

Rosie was always told her red hair was a curse, but she never believed it. She often dreamed what it would look like under a white veil with the man of her dreams by her side. However, her life takes a harrowing turn in 1944 when she is forced out of her home and sent to the most gruesome of places: Auschwitz. Upon arrival, Rosie's head is shaved and along with the loss of her beautiful hair, she loses the life she once cherished. Among the chaos and surrounded by hopelessness, Rosie realizes the only thing the Nazis cannot take away from her is the fierce redhead resilience in her spirit. When all of her friends conclude they are going to heaven from Auschwitz, she remains determined to get home. She summons all of her courage, through death camps and death marches to do just that.
