


What Happened to Nina? / Dervla McTiernan Fiction 2024




Mrs Winterbottom Takes a Gap Year / Joanna Nell Fiction 2023

The Magpie's Sister / Kerri Turner Fiction 2023





In Bad Faith / Dassi Erlich with Ellen Whinnett Non Fiction 2024



As a young girl growing up in a strict ultra-Orthodox family, Dassi's life was preordained - marry young, live a devout life and raise children within the Adass community's religious rules. This righteous path would keep her safe from the immodest, secular world just a few blocks away in suburban Melbourne. But the Adass community was not safe for Dassi. She was fifteen when her revered school principal, Malka Leifer, started to single her out. Dassi's cloistered and harsh upbringing meant she didn't have the words for what was happening to her, but she knew it was very, very wrong. It would take her years to break free of the secrecy which pervaded the community and tell the police of her betrayal. And only then would she find out others, including two of her sisters, had also been abused, and would learn some in the Adass community had helped Leifer flee to Israel. Dassi found the strength to fight, leading a brave fifteen-year campaign to bring Leifer back to face Australian courts.



Dirt and dust: a teenage perspective on life after the suicide of a parent




COCKY a Rare Breed: The Legend of Cocky Easton: Larrikin, War Hero, Champion Racehorse Trainer / Brown, Margaret Non Fiction 2015



The Cocky Easton story is a remarkable tale of mateship and survival in the Australian bush, in the Japanese POW camps during WWII, and around the racetracks during the 1950s and 1960s. It is a compilation of other people's stories presented in a narrative style. Charles William 'Cocky' Easton was a war hero, awarded the highest honour for a volunteer during WWII, the Military Medal. He returned to South West Queensland at the end of the war to train racehorses and achieved seven winners in seven races at Eulo in 1956, and he did it a second time in Cunnamulla on 6 May 1961. Cocky was no saint and he will be remembered for his roguish behaviour and irreverent sense of humour. His racetrack antics are legendary and already celebrated in verse, including the time he moved the three-furlong post at

Charleville. His natural talent for skulduggery was honed on the bush racetracks before the war, and put to good use when his life and the lives of his POW comrades depended on it. He stole, borrowed and pilfered food and drugs to keep his mates alive during their internment, but he will be remembered for lifting their spirits in the camps when all hope seemed lost. Cocky Easton was a rare breed...and we won't meet anyone quite like him again.

Joan in India / Suzanne Falkiner Non Fiction 2008



A biography of Joan Falkiner (1917-2003). In 1939 young Joan Falkiner's spirited flight from South Yarra to princely India and her marriage to the Muslim ruler of a small state in Gujarat sent shockwaves through Melbourne society and political reverberations throughout the Raj and the highest reaches of the British Government. How did it all come about? And who was Joan, exactly? Her names offer a glimpse Her Highness the Begum of Palanpur, Madame Palanpur, Jahan Ara, Jha, plain Joan, daughter of a family of self-made sheepmen from the Riverina. Through interviews conducted in Melbourne, Mumbai and the south of France, research in the India Office Library in London, and her own observations while travelling in modern India, Suzanne Falkiner succeeds remarkably in reassembling the pieces of the puzzle that was Joan.
