

What Can I Catch?

Golden Perch (Yellowbelly)



A medium to large fish with a deep, laterally compressed body. The body colour being generally olive-green with a yellow or cream belly. The mouth is large with the lower jaw protruding slightly. The tail is rounded.

Distribution: Prefers warm slow moving turbid sections of streams but also found in flooded backwaters and stocked impoundments.

Size: Common length - 40cm, maximum length - 75cm. Up to 23kg.

Tips The species is an opportunistic carnivore. The natural diet of an adult fish consists mainly of shrimp, yabbies, small fish and benthic aquatic insect larvae. Juvenile fish consume more of the smaller items such as aquatic larvae and micro crustaceans. They seem to like shrimp bait bobbed gently up and down amongst logs. Small deep diving lures are also a popular catching method. They are most active at dawn or dusk in rising water. Highly attracted to slow moving spinnerbaits.

Murray Cod



The largest Australian freshwater fish. Easily identified by its large mouth, cream to white belly and green mottled pattern on the body and head. Adults have a broad head with a concave profile and the spine front portion of the long, single dorsal fin is longer than the softer rear portion. The tail is rounded.

Distribution: Likes areas of low flow, resides around undercut banks and fallen timber.

Size: Common length - 65cm, maximum length - 180cm. Up to 113.6kg.

Tips Generally associated with deep holes in rivers, the Murray Cod prefers habitats with instream cover such as rocks, stumps, fallen trees or undercut banks. A 'sit and wait' predator, its natural diet consistent of fish, crayfish and frogs. Baits of crayfish, mussels or small live fish are popular. Murray Cod will also rise to lures.

Silver Perch



A medium to large fish with a body that becomes deeper and more laterally compressed with age. The single dorsal fin has a higher, spinous anterior section and a lower, rayed section at the rear. The body colour is grey to grey-brown with a lighter belly. The scales are much smaller than those on Golden or Macquarie perch, and the head and mouth are small. The tail is weakly forked.

Distribution: Prefer lowland, turbid and slow-flowing rivers.

Size: Common length - 30cm, maximum length - 50cm. Up to 8kg.

Tips The Silver Perch is omnivorous. Their natural diet consists of aquatic plants, snails, shrimps and aquatic insect larvae. Bait of prawn and worms are common. Schools do accumulate at the heads of waterholes and flowing reaches, and they can be easily attracted to a fly or lure.

Freshwater Catfish (Eel-tailed Catfish, Jewfish)



A medium sized species with a laterally compressed rear portion of the body. The head is large and four pairs of barbels surround the mouth, with its thick fleshy lips. The skin is smooth with no scales. The back of adults is usually olive-green to brown, and the belly whitish. Juveniles tend to be grey-brown, mottled with darker blotches.

Distribution: Often found on sand or gravel bottoms in slow moving streams, or in impoundments.

Size: Common length - 40cm, maximum length - 90cm. Up to 6.8kg.

Tips Many anglers use shrimp or worm. They are often caught in shallow water off grassy banks particularly from dusk.

Spangled Perch



A small to medium sized, laterally compressed fish with a relatively slender body for a grunter. The single dorsal fin has a moderately sized notch between the spinous and soft-rayed portions. The pelvic fins are inserted behind the origin of the pectoral fins. The anal and pelvic fins are white.

The back is generally brown to steely-blue and the sides silvery-grey with numerous bronze to rusty-brown spots. The tail is slightly forked, the eye is small to moderate, and the mouth is of moderate size with equal jaws.

Distribution: Prefer areas of rapid flow

Size: Common length - 15cm, maximum length - 33cm

Tips The Spangled Perch feeds mainly during daylight hours and is primarily a carnivore, although it consumes some plant material. Aquatic insects, shrimps, prawns, micro crustaceans and fish are important components of their natural diet. This perch can be very abundant, especially after flooding.

Make it Legal

Remember to abide with the regulations regarding licensing, weight and bag limits and restricted seasons, and restricted locations for fishing in both Queensland and New South Wales when in our region.

From the clear, rocky upper reaches of the Dumaesq River, to the muddy waters of the lower Macintyre River, creeks, lagoons and Coolmunda Dam, you will have plenty of options to weigh up. Picturesque public and private areas for camping abound, so come for a weekend or come for a week, you won't be disappointed.

Where can't I fish?

Closed Waters

The following areas do not permit fishing:

- Dumaesq River:** from Bonshaw Weir to 100m downstream of Bonshaw Weir
- Macintyre Brook:** from 100m upstream to 200m downstream of Coolmunda Dam spillway wall, Whetstone Weir and Ben Dor Weir
- Macintyre River:** from 150m upstream to 150m downstream of Goondiwindi Weir

Where can I put the boat in?

Boat Ramps

All with toilets, drinking water, adjacent picnic areas, and rubbish bins
